10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE
Goomalling Post Office & quarters, a brick and iron building, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:
 - it is an important visual element in the main street streetscape of Goomalling;
 - it is important for its association with the development of postal and telecommunication services in the Goomalling District;
 - the place has an association with Hillson Beasley, PWD Chief Architect from 1905 to 1917, and his successor, William Burden Hardwick;

the development of the post office parallels the development of the town and district; and,

the place has community social value as a communications centre in Goomalling.
