10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Wellsteads' Homestead Group, comprising John's Cottage, Main Homestead House, sheep pens, Girls' Room, workshops, Boys' Room, Shearing Shed, Wool Barn, and 'Mount Joy' Homestead House, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is a rare, early, and intact example of an isolated farm homestead group, in which most buildings are constructed in granite construction, and retains an unusually large number of original artefacts associated with the development of the place;

the place is a picturesque complex of homogenous granite Victorian Georgian design buildings sited in an imposing position on a rise and along the end of a grassy valley;

the place was the first farm complex established by European settlers at Bremer Bay, one of the earliest in the south-east region, and has been a central and integral part of the area's development since the mid-19th century;

the place demonstrates, to a high degree, the exceptionally self-reliant and resourceful lifestyle of an early pioneering family in Western Australia and in particular the diligence and acumen brought to the development of the place by its founders, John Wellstead and his family to the present;

the place was established by John Wellstead, and has remained in his family through successive generations to today; and,

the place has associations for members of the Nyoongar community whose ancestors worked at the place, particularly the McGlade family.

The Museum building, which is the relocated Goods Shed from Wagin, the new sheds to the north and north-east of the barn, the new sheds behind the peppermint grove to the west of the valley floor, the shed and garage on the site of the dairy and the shed to the rear of 'Mount Joy' are considered to have little significance at the present (2006-07) period.
