10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Marwick's Shed, a large timber framed vernacular building with relatively low masonry external walls and a dominant pitched roof clad in galvanised corrugated iron, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is a rare example of local 19th century vernacular construction techniques, particularly the employment of a timber structure to create a large volume without internal load-bearing walls;

the place exemplifies the strategic location of York as a route for transporting supplies to the goldfields prior to the completion of the Perth-Coolgardie railway line;

the place has aesthetic value. Its form is unusual but evidently vernacular and, having acquired patina through many years of exposure to the elements, the building has a rustic appearance that relates harmoniously with the surrounding landscape; the place functioned as an early form of depot for William Marwick's York-based road haulage business and as such is a memorial to the lives of William Marwick (snr) and his descendants who have played a leading role in the civic and business affairs of York for over 125 years;

within the context of Newcastle Street, York, *Marwick's Shed* is one of the more prominent and memorable visual elements, serving as a local landmark; and,

the place is a rare building type. Few vernacular structures of similar form and age are known to exist in Western Australia.
