10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

Scarborough Clock Tower, a precast sandblasted concrete and stainless steel clock tower, together with the paved surrounds, bench seats, garden beds and time capsule, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

completed as a joint project between the Rotary Club of Scarborough and the City of Stirling, the construction of the place was one of the few community amenity projects undertaken to commemorate the 150th anniversary of white settlement of Western Australia in 1979; and,

the place is valued as an important community commemorative project and a prominent landmark associated with a popular beach.
