10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

*Inglewood Police Station & Police Quarters (fmr)*, a red brick and terracotta tile police station with adjacent quarters displaying elements of the Inter-War Bungalow, Georgian Revival, and Mediterranean styles with Art Deco influenced interior features and fittings, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is a rare example of an extant c.1940 Police Station and Police Quarters in the metropolitan area;

the place contributes to an understanding of the development of policing in Western Australia;

the place is representative of the departmental practice of using domestic scale architecture in police places during the early to mid twentieth-century; and,

the place is aesthetically pleasing in its domestic scale, fine architectural styling and interior detailing.

The metal garage is of little significance.
