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## 10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

*Terrace Houses, 235-241 Beaufort Street*, comprising four three and four storey brick, stucco, and iron terrace houses in the Federation Filigree style, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is a very fine, substantial, and relatively intact example of terrace houses in the Federation Filigree style;

Nos. 235-241 are rare as a group of three-storey terrace houses constructed in the State in the Federation-period;

the place is a distinctive set of buildings, with Nos. 235-241 being a significant visual focus and the tower of No. 235 being a very prominent and well-known landmark in the context of Beaufort Street;

the place was constructed in 1897 as some of the large number of new boarding houses constructed in the State in the 1890s to accommodate the population increase associated with the gold boom, and provides evidence of the historical provision of lodging in the North Perth area, an inner-city residential function that is no longer common; and,

for at least twenty years from 1899, 237 Beaufort Street was used as one of a small number of nurses' homes in Perth, which provided accommodation, employment services and advocacy for private nurses, in a central area close to the city.

Garages to the rear of the northern properties Nos. 235-241 are of little significance. Modern red brick fences to the rear of properties have little significance.
