10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Glanville's Buildings has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place demonstrates the idiosyncratic architectural style of Norman Hitchcock, who practised architecture in Melbourne and later in <u>the</u> metropolitan area at the turn-of-the century;

although altered internally, the restored exterior of the two-storey building is the best example of the full range of 'signature' details of Hitchcock; apart from being a major example of Hitchcock's residential architecture in Western Australia, the place is a key link between Hitchcock's architectural design in Melbourne and Perth;

the place occupies a prime location, being particularly noticeable from the Swan River, the building is a Fremantle landmark; and,

is valued by the community as a landmark building which reflects the exuberance of gold boom architecture at the turn-of-the century.
