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#### 10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Greenough Road Board Office (fmr) building and grounds, consisting of a single room rectangular stone building of Victorian Georgian style with brick quoining to corners and openings and a corrugated roof, and a concrete lined corrugated galvanised iron water tank (1907) at the northern corner of the building, are of cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is a well executed and intact example of a modest stone civic building;

the place is located in the centre of Greenough, a precinct of significant buildings which together form a cultural landscape of considerable significance;

the place is the former centre of local government in Greenough;

the place is typical of local government buildings constructed in early twentieth century regional Western Australia; and the place contributes to the Greenough community's sense of place. It has served as venue for the Anglican Ladies Guild and has continuing associations as a venue for the Anglican Sunday School.

The following features on and in the building are intrusive: Floorboards cut to access under floor, metal patches on ground floor, while the following are considered of little significance: Timber skirting on elevation 1, 3 and 4, timber mantle and rendered wall finish on elevation 2.

No physical evidence has remained of a former 'tool' shed (1907). The remains of a concrete slab to the north (rear) of the building are the only possible remnants of a generator shed (1946).
