10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**  
*ABC Transmission Station*, a single-storey rendered masonry and asbestos building with entry pillars and gates, showing characteristics of the Inter War Stripped Classical style, together with associated transmission tower, outbuildings, original fence and roadside sugar gums, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons;

the place was the first regional radio station in Western Australia and formed part of the national network of the Australian Broadcasting Commission;

the place was built between 1935 and 1936 by the Commonwealth Department of Works for the Post Master Generals Department, and was purpose built to house the transmission equipment for the mast which broadcast radio signals to the south west of Western Australia;

the place was a significant technical achievement at the time of construction as the mast was the tallest and most powerful (10kW) in Australia, and remained so in 1957 when it was converted to a 50kW transmitter;

the transmission station building and adjacent transmission tower are a landmark on the Arthur Road between Arthur River and Wagin. Together they form a significant cultural environment associated with radio communication;

the place is valued as a regional example of a building exhibiting the principle characteristics of the Inter War Stripped Classical style; and,

the place has social value for the South West community providing initially work opportunities during the depression and subsequently an important means of communication and a venue for community events.
