10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**
St Paul's Anglican Church, Presbytery and Hall, Beaconsfield, comprising St Paul's Hall, a Federation Gothic limestone church Hall and former Mission Church (1891-1892), St Paul's Church, a Federation Gothic limestone church (1905-1906), a Victorian Georgian brick and limestone Presbytery (1895), and Church Bell (c.1922), has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place includes a rare example of a Mission Church, demonstrating the Anglican practice of establishing modest mission churches early in the development of communities, prior to the community growth justifying more substantial churches;

St Paul's Anglican Church is a good example of a suburban Federation Gothic style church, retaining its original form and set in a pleasing collection of late nineteenth to early twentieth century religious buildings, which together form a prominent landmark within a largely residential streetscape;

the place is associated with architects Howard Evans and Joseph Herbert Eales; and,

the place demonstrates the principal characteristics of a functional place of worship in the Anglican Church, as well as demonstrating the ongoing theological and physical development of the Anglican faith.

Modern additions to the eastern end of St Paul's Church, as well as the ancillary structures such as the Church office, Community Centre, Gazebo, Garage, and Public Toilet are not considered to be of heritage significance.
