10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Faversham, comprising a single storey laterite and weatherboard house and three laterite cottages in the Federation Queen Anne style, weatherboard and iron stables, an iron loft/garage, tank stand, and associated plantings, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

Faversham House is an intact and excellent example of Federation Queen Anne style with the interior displaying particularly fine examples of lath and plaster ceilings, decorative leaded glass, joinery and intact door furniture;

the place contains rare examples of domestic servants' accommodation;

the place is associated with the early development of Mundaring as a town and holiday destination following the completion of the Eastern Railway and the Goldfields Water Supply Scheme;

the place is associated with Alexander McCallum OBE who played an important service role during World War I;

the place is a representative example of the trend at the end of the first quarter of the 20th century to convert large private homes into private hospitals;

the place is associated with Norma Monger who was responsible for forming the WA branch of the Australian Nursing Services, and with her sister Ethel, who together, were important in the Mundaring district; and,

the place illustrates the way of life of the wealthy and professional classes during the first quarter of the 20th century.

The modern additions on the eastern side of Mulberry cottage, and the extension on the western side of Cumquat cottage, are later additions and are considered to be of low significance. The pool to the west of the main residence is also considered to be of low significance.
