10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills, a timber weatherboard and iron roofed structure demonstrating characteristics of Federation Carpenter Gothic architectural style, in a rural setting with an associated cemetery, is of cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is the only remaining element of the former town of Greenhills, and a rare example of church and cemetery that are no

longer associated with a town, the latter providing evidence of many families associated with the Greenhills district from the 1890s to 2001;

the place is rare in Western Australia as a timber weatherboard church with a highly finished interior, and is a good representative example of a rural church of Federation Carpenter Gothic style of architecture still in use;

the place was developed and maintained by prominent Greenhills district community members the Penny family, who were among the earliest European settlers in the area, were involved in local government and lent the name from their farm 'Green Hills' to the area and church; and,

the place represents the continued association of the Anglican Church on the site since 1895, and has been an important social and religious centre for the Anglican community since its construction in 1912, with generations of funerals, baptisms and marriages celebrated in the church, which continues to the present.
