10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Hill 60, a large single-storey brick and tile residence in the Federation Queen Anne style with elements of Inter-War Free Classical style, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is important as an early homestead in the Belmont area; it is an interesting blend of Federation Queen Anne style which has been overlaid with elements of Inter-War Free Classical style;

the place is historically important for its association with mining and racing identity, Thomas Ryan, and in that it provided the opportunity for the establishment of the first hospital in the district; the place is rare as it is one of the few remaining examples of early residences in the Belmont district;

the place has the potential to demonstrate a distinctive way of life of prosperous landowners of the Belmont district; the site is also important for the existence of a fresh water spring to which neighbours had access; and,

the place is prominently located on a high portion of land between Great Eastern Highway and the Swan River with extensive views up the river and across to the City of Perth.

The surrounding hospital and convent buildings are not included in this assessment and are considered to be intrusive.
