Two brick houses with corrugated iron roofs and front verandahs, built in c.1910 and located behind the gaol complex overlooking Low Street to the river.

The place has been assesed by the National Trust of Australia (WA) and has been entered in the Register held by that body as a classified building with the following statement of significance:

The two houses are important elements of the Courthouse/Gaol complex. Their architectural character is typical of simple late Victorian Housing without embellishment. Their presence contributes to the environmental character of grounds behind Avon Terrace and overlooking the sites of the first government buildings in the town.

The place has also been assessed by the Australian Heritage Commission and has been entered in the Register of the National Estate with the following statement of significance:
