3. DESCRIPTION OF ELEMENTS INCLUDED IN THE ENTRY (GENERAL)

Gray's Store was completed in 1861. The simple rectangular limestone building was constructed by Henry Gray using convict labour and comprises a two storey section and an attached single storey store. Within its large stone-walled courtyard is a fresh water well cut through the limestone and a circular stone water-tank which is partly underground.

Architecturally significant because it is a two storey structure built of the local stone. Historically it had a long association with the township as general store and because of its age. Also an important part of the group.
