10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**
Jardee School (fmr), comprising a single storey timber Schoolhouse (1913,1919) and a separate Single Teacher's Quarters (1926) in a vernacular style, a Shelter Shed (1919) and extensive tree plantings, dating from 1927, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is a rare surviving example of a small school complex of timber construction comprising a Schoolhouse, Shelter Shed, and Single Teacher's Quarters, on its original site that retains vestiges of its original use;

the place is a good representative example of a timber mill town school that, from 1913 to 1972, provided primary education for the children of mill workers and local settlers, including migrant families and Displaced Persons during the post-World War II period, when evening classes were also provided to teach adult migrants English;

the place demonstrates the composition of a small school in the South-West established from the pre-World War I period, and as few other such schools remain intact on their original sites, may be used as a reference or benchmark site;

the place demonstrates the variations made to the Public Works Department's standard school plans and illustrates the development of a small rural school in the South- West, and

the density and variety of mature tree plantings on the site that date from 1927 give the place a landmark quality, and the trees with their progeny, have scientific value by way of illustrating their potential growth patterns and horticultural requirements.

The two Earth Closets (1960), one located within the curtilage and one located on the adjacent lot, are of little significance and were removed in June 2013. The Married Teacher's Quarters on the adjacent Lot are not included in this assessment.
