- 10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**
Bruce Rock Hotel, a two-storey brick and iron building in the Federation Filigree style, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:
 - the place was one of six State Hotels constructed in developing country districts between 1911 and 1916, and is one of seven established in the State;
 - the place is an integral component of the main streetscape of Bruce Rock. It makes a significant contribution to the townscape and character of the town, and contributes to the community's sense of place;

the place is a fine representative example of a rural town hotel built in the Federation Filigree style. Typical of the period of construction, the hotel is located on a prominent corner site;

the place was established as a result of the Western Australian Government's philosophy which promoted State ownership of commercial enterprises for the benefit of the people;

the place is highly valued for its social associations by the local town and farming community; and,

the place is the only remaining example of two identical State Hotels built in the Bruce Rock Shire.
