10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

Maley's Mill, a complex of industrial and agricultural structures constructed principally of limestone masonry, timber floor and roof framing, and corrugated iron roof cladding in the Victorian Georgian style, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

its historical use during the nineteenth century as a steam driven flour mill within Greenough, which developed in the 1850s and 1850s as 'the granary of the colony';

the place demonstrates the cultural and economic development on the Front Flats of Greenough in the years prior to the opening of the railway to Walkaway;

the association between its development and George Shenton, Solomon Cook and J. S. Maley;

the place is a component within Maley's commercial and agricultural development of Greenough;

the place is rare example of a flour mill with a co-located general store, and the interior of the store is in itself rare for its authentic nineteenth century shop fittings;

the place is representative of a nineteenth century steam flour mill, built in the colonial vernacular tradition;

the mill forms a component of an historic precinct characterised by a homogeneity of materials and forms; and,

the picturesque quality of the mill located within a rural landscape and its prominence as a landmark both contribute to the community of Greenough's sense of place.

The steel roller door, the steel pergola and repairs using formed concrete and concrete blocks are assessed as having no significance.
