10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Aldgate House & Stables, East Fremantle (c.1897), comprising Aldgate House, a substantial single-storey, limestone and brick Federation Queen Anne style residence, and adjacent limestone former Stables building, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

Aldgate House is a fine and substantial example of a Federation Queen Anne residence, with highly decorative, hand-painted interior treatment, in the form of murals, friezes and stencils;

the interior hand-painted decoration of Aldgate House is rare for being intact and well-conserved, and has potential to yield information as a valuable source for further study, colours and materials analysis;

the place is a rare extant example of a substantial residence with its original associated stables building in situ;

built on a prominent and elevated location with orchestrated views overlooking the Swan River, the place is representative of substantial and highly decorative residences built on large, river facing lots in East Fremantle during the gold boom period;

the Stables building demonstrates an era in which wealthy individuals travelled by personal horse and coach and constructed and maintained premises for staff and animals. The building is indicative of a way of life no longer practiced; and,

the place is significant for its association with the prominent migrant businessmen and local politician Paul Strelitz, for whom the place was originally constructed in c.1897.

The modern outbuildings associated with Aldgate House (carport and swimming pool) and two-storey residence adjacent to the Stables are considered to have no heritage significance.
