2. **NAME** Broome Historical Museum

3. DESCRIPTION OF ELEMENTS INCLUDED IN THE ENTRY (GENERAL)

A single storey building with formed concrete walls and timber framed corrugated iron clad roof. Built circa 1890 as the Queen's Warehouse and subsequently used by customs, the building has recently been converted for use as a museum for the local history society.

7. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE OF PLACE (ASSESSMENT IN DETAIL)

The place has been assessed by the National Trust of Australia (WA) and has been entered in the Register held by that body as a classified building with the following statement of significance:

An interesting example of the development of the Broome house form into larger public buildings. The early use of in-situ concrete is also significant.

The place has been assessed by the Australian Heritage Commission and has been entered in the Register of the National Estate with the following statement of significance:

Historically significant for its associations with Broome's extensive trade in pearl shell and Asian goods, for which activities this building served as customs house from 1889. Architecturally the building is an early example of formed concrete construction.
