10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Shamrock Hotel, Northam, a two-storey stone, brick and corrugated iron building constructed in a series of developments since 1861, and stylistically dominated by the 1890s extensions that were originally constructed in Federation Filigree style, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

with its imposing main façade and prominent location, the place is both a landmark and an important component in the historic streetscape of Northam's main commercial street;

the evolution of the place from the Farmer's Home Hotel (1866) to the Shamrock Hotel (1890s) mirrors the development of Northam from a small country town to an important regional centre;

the place is an unusual example of a building that has, through innovation and creativity, incorporated a number of building phases into a cohesive structure which displays architectural integrity; and,

the interior of the place retains many original elements, as demonstrated by the richly detailed foyer, pressed metal ceilings, stained glass windows, fireplaces and timber detailing.
