10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE
Greenough Pioneer Cemetery, a municipal cemetery reserve divided into denominational sections, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place has landmark quality with respect to the nationally significant Greenough Hamlet,

the place has been used as a cemetery since 1864 and serves as a burial place for many individuals and families who were associated with the development of the Greenough area. Some of these people include; pioneer pastoralists Major Logue and Thomas Brown, the Waldeck family, the Maley Family, the Clinch family, and also the graves of a number of Pensioner Guards who had been stationed at the town;

the place has significant cultural and religious associations with the different denominations who have been, and still are, involved with the cemetery;

the place is one of the largest and most intact pioneer cemeteries located in the mid-west region of Western Australia; and,

the place is representative of a number of cemeteries in Western Australia which were established as settlements developed. It provides an example of how western societies divided and administered burial grounds on a cultural and denominational basis.
