PHYSICAL AND DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE

The tree is a fine spreading Moreton Bay Fig Tree defying the traffic of a busy modern intersection.

The Proclamation Tree was planted on October 21 1890 - Trafalgar Day - to commemorate the granting of responsible government to the colony of Western Australia.

Governor Sir W F Robinson performed the planting ceremony, and the tree was provided by Phillip Webster, an auditor with the Fremantle Council of the day.

Forty years later, students of the nearby Fremantle Boys' School donated and mounted a plaque at the site.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The place has been assessed by the National Trust of Australia (WA) and has been entered in the Register held by that body as a classified place with the following statement of significance:

The two memorials side by side - the tree and the cross - have architectural, historic, environmental and social importance for the City of Fremantle.
