10. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Cloisters, and the adjacent Port Jackson Fig Tree, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place has a close association with Bishop Blagdon Hale and the establishment of secondary education in Western Australia;

the place was the first purpose-built secondary school in Western Australia;

it is a fine example of the Victorian Tudor style of architecture, demonstrating a sensitive use of local materials;

it is a fine example of the buildings designed by Richard Roach Jewell, an important colonial architect;

it is one of a small number of remaining convict-built colonial buildings of the mid-nineteenth century;

the retention and conservation of the place was significant in the development of conservation awareness in the state; and

the place is a landmark in the central Perth business district.
