  10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**  

*Subiaco Fallen Soldiers' Memorial*, a chiming memorial clock tower in the Interwar Free Classical style, built in red brick with Donnybrook stone facings on

a Meckering granite base with a copper clad roof, against a backdrop of mature trees, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is rare in Australia as a war memorial with a clock, and unique in Western Australia as a war memorial featuring chiming bells;

the place was built in 1923 to commemorate those local residents who died in World War I and continues to be used for civic ceremonies by the Subiaco community;

the place is an excellent representation of an Interwar Free Classical style clock tower; and,

the place is a landmark emphasised by its prominent position on the corner of Rokeby and Hamersley Roads, especially when illuminated at night, and as such contributes to the civic precinct in which it is situated and creates an entry statement for Rankin Gardens.

The landscaping around the clock tower is of little significance.
