10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

Dalgety House, Roebourne, a single-storey timber framed, corrugated iron clad residence in the Northwest Vernacular style, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is uncommon as a substantially intact timber-framed corrugated iron-clad residence in the Pilbara region with a late nineteenth-century core, designed in response to local climatic conditions;

the place is associated with Dalgety & Co., who provided essential shipping, stock and merchandise to the northwest, and thus the place has a link with the historic development of the northwest of the State;

the place is highly valued by the Indigenous population in Roebourne as a site of congregation; and,

the place is a landmark at the southern end of Roe Street.

Intrusive items include vinyl floor coverings, air-conditioning units and fluorescent lighting.
