10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

Faversham House, a two-storey stone residence with timber floors and corrugated iron roof, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

 - the place was built and extended by successive generations of the Monger family, some of Western Australia's more significant early settlers, reflecting the growth and development of York;
 - the place was constructed with the assistance of convict labour at the commencement of the convict era in 1850;
 - the place is highly valued by the local community and important to the cultural fabric of the York district;

the place has been a focal point for social, medical, religious and educational associations;

as one of the larger residential complexes in York with a total of almost fifty rooms, the scale of the place makes it a rare example of colonial architecture; and,

its situation, high on a hill overlooking the centre of York, gives the place a landmark quality from many directions including the main street, Avon Terrace.
