11. ASSESSMENT OF CULTURAL HERITAGE SIGNIFICANCE

11. 1 AESTHETIC VALUE*

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills is a good example of a church designed in the Federation Carpenter Gothic architectural style, with a highly finished interior. (Criterion 1.1)

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills, contributes to the picturesque setting and overall rural landscape of Greenhills. (Criterion 1.3)

11. 2. HISTORIC VALUE

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills represents the continued association of the Anglican Church on the site since 1895. (Criterion 2.1)

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills became isolated after the planned railway that was to go past the small town of Greenhills was altered and took a more northerly route following successful lobbying by Mrs Mary Ann McMullen, thus contributing to the lack of further development of Greenhills. (Criterion 2.1)

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills was developed and maintained by prominent Greenhills district community members the Penny family, having were among earliest European settlers in the area, were involved in local government and lent the name from their farm 'Green Hills' to the area and church. (Criterion 2.3)

11. 3. SCIENTIFIC VALUE

The cemetery has the potential to reveal, through archaeological excavation. details of the previous occupants of the region. (Criterion 3.1)

11. 4. SOCIAL VALUE

St Andrew's Cemetery is no longer open for public burials, however the place provides evidence of the families associated with the Greenhills district from the 1890s to 2001. (Criterion 4.1)

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills is important to the families and descendants of those buried in the cemetery and to the community as a place associated with many of the districts early pioneers. (Criterion 4.2)

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills has been an important social and religious centre for the Anglican community in the Greenhills district since its construction in 1912, with generations of funerals, baptisms and marriages being celebrated in the church. (Criterion 4.1)

St Andrew's Anglican Church (1912), Greenhills Cemetery (1894) and the ruins of the original St Andrew's Church (1895), are valued by the Greenhills community and broader York district for their contribution to the community's sense of place through the associated activities held at the church and cemetery (Criterion 4.2)

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills is valued by the local Greenhills community, as demonstrated by its inclusion in the Shire of Greenhills Municipal Inventory. (Criterion 4.2)

DEGREE OF SIGNIFICANCE 12.

12. 1. RARITY

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills is the only remaining element of the former town of Greenhills, and a rare example of church and cemetery that is no longer associated with a town.

The place is rare in Western Australia as an extant, in use, timber weatherboard church with a highly finished interior.

12. 2 REPRESENTATIVENESS

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills is a good representative example of a rural church showing influences of Federation Carpenter Gothic style of architecture. (Criterion 6.1)

12. 3 CONDITION

St Andrew's Anglican Church has received limited maintenance over a period of many years. However, the cumulative effects of weathering and the lack of programmed maintenance and financial resources is evident on the exterior. The interior has been maintained at a relatively high level. Overall the place is in a fair to good condition.

The Cemetery is generally in good condition. The grounds appear to be maintained. The perimeter fence on the east, south and west sides is in fair condition and the front fence and gate are in good condition.

12.4 INTEGRITY

St Andrew's Anglican Church original design and functional intention of this place is evident. The place has retained a high degree of integrity.

The Cemetery has moderate integrity. The Cemetery is officially closed however descendants of those interred can seek permission to be interred at the cemetery.

12. 5 AUTHENTICITY

St Andrew's Anglican Church original fabric has been retained for the most part, except for some timber stumps that have been replaced with concrete, and the entry steps. The place has a moderate to high degree of authenticity.

The Cemetery has high authenticity as the original headstones and layout remain.

13. SUPPORTING EVIDENCE

13. 3 COMPARATIVE INFORMATION

There are 835 churches recorded in the Heritage Council of Western Australia (HCWA) database. There are 90 churches on the Register of Heritage Places; Metropolitan (37), Peel (0), Southwest (11), Great Southern (7), Wheatbelt (6), Goldfields (2), Midwest (19), Gascoyne (2), Pilbara (2) and Kimberley (4). Of these 90 churches, 6 are found in the Wheatbelt; St Paul's Anglican Church and Graveyard, Beverley, 1859; St John the Baptist Church, Moora. 1908; Holy Trinity Church, York, 1854; St Patrick's Catholic Church, Presbytery and Hall, York, 1887; St Luke's Church, Cemetery and Belfry, Gingin, 1861 and Narembeen Museum, Narembeen, 1928.

Of the 90 churches on the Register of Heritage Places, four are Federation Carpenter Gothic style of architecture churches; St Patrick's Anglican Church (fmr) and War Memorial, Bunbury, Southwest, 1908; St Columba's Church and Hall, Peppermint Grove, Metropolitan, 1909; St Peter's Anglican Church, Tambellup, Great Southern, 1910 and St Luke's Anglican Church Group, Mosman Park, Metropolitan, 1897.

Of the 90 churches on the Register of Heritage Places, there are seven weatherboard churches; St Peters Anglican Church, Tambellup, Great Southern, 1910; St Columba's Church and Hall, Peppermint Grove, Metropolitan, 1909; St Matthews Anglican Church, Port Hedland, Pilbara, 1917; St Mark's Anglican Church, Bunbury, Southwest, 1842; St Patrick's Anglican Church (fmr) & War Memorial, Bunbury, Southwest, 1908; St Joseph's Church and Cottage, Harvey, Southwest, 1906 and Narembeen Museum, Narembeen, Wheatbelt, 1928.

Of the 90 churches on the Register of Heritage Places, 16 were built within the same period (5 years prior and 5 years post the date of construction for this place); of these 16 churches only one is in the Wheatbelt; St John the Baptist Church (R.C), Moora, 1908.

St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills is a rare example of a weatherboard church in the Wheatbelt. St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills is a rare Federation Carpenter Gothic extant Church in the Wheatbelt region of Western Australia.
