10. **STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

*Freemasons' Hall (Fmr), Subiaco*, a two-storey Inter War Free Classical style brick, stucco, and zincalume roof structure, has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

the place is a very fine example of a twentieth century translation of classical Federation architecture largely in the inter-war free classical style;

the design of the building, in particular the detailing of the front façade and interior spaces, demonstrates the eighteenth century origins of Freemason philosophy translated into the practical requirements of twentieth century suburban Perth. The intact vaulted plaster ceilings, in particular the clearly enunciated focal point in the main meeting room, recall the majesty of Baroque interiors;

largely intact and of high integrity, the place is held in high regard for its symbolic and social associations, especially by the fraternity of Freemasons; and,

a Subiaco landmark, the place is an essential part of the heritage fabric of Subiaco and contributes to the community's sense of place.

The partition work, windows to the side elevations and paint treatment to the exterior are of little significance. The carport is of no significance.
